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My Robin's Story

I was walking to school with my friends when one of them pointed to a pink speck on the wet sidewalk. As we approached the little thing, we began to realize that it was a baby bird. We studied it trying to figure whether it was alive or not, then suddenly it opened its beak and took a gasp of air.



We stayed there looking for a nest, or a parent, but neither was in sight. My friends wanted to leave it, thinking it was a lost cause, but I couldn't leave it to die alone, not even being able to see or hear. I called my mom and the only solution she had was to leave it as food for another animal. "It's the circle of life sweetie, there's nothing we can do."

I began to well up with tears, unable to leave the little bird, so I kept texting my mom until I guilted her into coming and getting it. She picked it up and put it in a plastic bag so it would keep warm. She began to ask around what she should do to save the bird. A person suggested calling Tims Ford State Park; she did, and they told her about Ziggy's Tree Wildlife Rehabilitation Center. She called Ms. LouAnn and brought the bird over. Right away Ms. LouAnn got to work on building the bird's health.

A couple weeks later Ms. LouAnn sent us a picture of my baby bird. It had the feathers of a robin! I was so happy that I didn't leave my robin for death. And now, it is almost ready to be released! I'm completely amazed at how my baby bird went from gasping for life on a sidewalk to a healthy bird who is ready to live its life. Thank you Ziggy's Tree!

American Robins

American Robins (*Turdus migratorius*) are one of the species we most often admit at Ziggy's Tree. They fledge (leave the nest) a few days before they can fly, and are often victim to free-roaming cats. They usually nest in trees, but will also occasionally nest on buildings. The parents will raise at least 2 clutches of babies each year, averaging 4 babies per clutch. The young are incubated for 12-14 days, and leave the nest at 14-16 days. Both parents tend to the young. The youngsters are generally self-sufficient by the time they are a month old.

Their diet includes earthworms, snails and other bugs, as well as fruit and berries when insects are less available.

NEWS

The weather this year has certainly caused some unusual activity for us. Our squirrel intakes this spring were about average, but with a lot of those babies being females, we are expecting that this fall and next spring could mean we'll be seeing a lot more baby squirrels.

Our songbirds have also arrived on a different schedule for us this year. We took in nearly 150 babies in May (about twice the normal number). So far this year, we've taken in 310 baby birds and another 50 adults. And we still have about 6 weeks of baby season to go! We're pleased to report that our release rate is around 75% this year, so most of these orphaned and injured birds are able to be returned to their natural habitats!

Our Barred Owl release in February was featured on the front page of the Winchester Herald Chronicle. What a great opportunity to educate the public on the work we do and how to help wildlife.

We are thrilled that our volunteer base has expanded. The extra hands have helped keep cages clean, birds fed, and our songbird rehabilitator sane.

We are also very grateful for the generosity of our rescuers and donors. With the fire at Walden's Puddle in June and their limited ability to take in new patients during their clean-up and construction, we were able to step in and assist with wildlife intakes and care. We're glad we could be here, both for the sake of the animals and the wonderful people who rescued and transported them to us.
