WORKING TOGETHER FOR WILDLIFE

We often say that wildlife wins when we all work together.

Sometimes it is as simple as contacting one of the other local small mammal or songbird specialists when we receive a single young animal. Most wildlife in their natural environment are raised as part of a family group. By combining the youngsters with conspecifics, either through transfer to another facility or accepting the animal into our care, the young wildlife benefits.

At other times, we may receive an animal for which we cannot provide appropriate long-term care. In this case we can reach out to other rehabilitation facilities to determine if they can provide the best ongoing care for a specific animal.

We admitted two interesting cases this spring that fall under this last category. In both of these cases, we were able to provide medical and supportive care until transfer to a more appropriate facility was available.

A Bonaparte's Gull (*Larus philadelphia*) was found on the runway at the Tullahoma Regional Airport, weak and unable to stand on April 7. The intake examination revealed that he was severely emaciated, but there was no evidence of fractures. We scheduled an appointment with our consulting veterinarian, Pet Medical Center. X-rays confirmed that there were no fractures and he tested negative for any intestinal parasites. He was prescribed daily swim therapy which allowed him to exercise his legs and keep his feathers clean. He continued to show improvement and after three weeks was moved to one of our pre-release cages with a kiddie pool to allow him more room to exercise,

Bonaparte's Gulls are winter residents in Tennessee. They spend their summers on their breeding grounds in Canada. As the gull continued to improve, we knew we did not have adequate space to allow him room to recuperate while waiting for this species to return this fall and winter.

There are very few federally permitted wildlife rehabilitators in Tennessee, and none that are set up to care for a gull that needs a large space with a pool. Thanks to contacts we had made over the years at state and national conferences, we were referred to Lake Erie Nature and Science Center in Bay Village, Ohio. In addition to wildlife and nature education programs, they also have a wildlife rehabilitation area with caging specific to birds that live on the water. The gull was transferred to their care on May 23.

We are happy to report that the gull has been progressing nicely and will be scheduled for release soon. There are reports of a small flock of Bonaparte's Gulls on Lake Erie. Our gull will join that flock.

On May 25 we received a call from one of the local game wardens. An adult Bald Eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) was found grounded in the Clifftops area of Monteagle. As the nearest federally permitted rehabilitator, we were asked to temporarily house him until transport could be arranged to the American Eagle Foundation in Pigeon Forge, TN.

Our initial examination revealed that while the bird was thin, he did not have any evidence of fractures. At the request of the staff at AEF, we arranged to transport the eagle to the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. The veterinary staff there completed x-rays and drew blood samples to check overall condition as well as lead or zinc toxicity.

The good news for the eagle was that there were no fractures and his bloodwork was negative for lead poisoning. We suspect he had sustained soft tissue injuries as a result of a collision with something, and as a result was unable to hunt.

The staff at AEF reports that he is doing well. He was treated for internal parasites and is molting, so he will have an extended stay at their facility.

HERE'S WHAT WE'VE BEEN UP TO

It's been a busy first half of the year for us! We've already passed the 500 mark on intakes.

We started off with a bang in February and March with the intake of over 40 neonate Eastern Gray Squirrels. We are one of the few facilities in middle Tennessee that can handle the intense feeding schedule of these eyes closed babies. While we were still admitting squirrels, baby season started for Virginia Opossums and Eastern Cottontails as well. We admitted 63 squirrels, 71 opossums and 82 cottontails this spring, along with a handful of mice and groundhogs.

Our mammal team didn't get much of a break this year – we've already started admitting the second round of opossums and squirrels. And of course, the cottontails have been coming in steadily all spring and summer as well.

Our baby bird season started in mid-April. Our heaviest intake months for young songbirds is May and June. We've just passed 200 baby bird intakes. While we admit primarily hatchling and nestling songbirds, we've also admitted nearly 50 injured adult birds this year as well.

Our phones stay busy with calls about potentially orphaned wildlife. We've worked diligently to assure that the animals we admit truly do need our care. We love to educate our callers on the natural history of the animals they have called about – especially when that means that they young animals can stay in their natural environment with their real parents. And it's a happy outcome for the caller as well – they get to see nature in action in their own backyard!

We've also been providing photographs of some of our hatchling and nestling songbirds to staff at Tufts University. They are developing a website to assist with identification of hatchlings and nestlings. They were pleased to receive this picture of one of our more unusual intakes this year – a 2 day old Common Nighthawk.
