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ANNUAL REPORT 2021

It's been another busy year here at Ziggy's Tree. Reptile and mammal intakes were up. We continue to feel the ramifications of COVID with some of our local network of wildlife rehabilitation organizations limiting intakes periodically throughout the year based on potential exposures and/or positive COVID tests. We're not sure what's normal these days.

We answered over 5,000 calls in 2021. Some calls were simply seeking information on how to peacefully coexist with their wild neighbors and determine humane methods of encouraging wildlife to move a little farther away from human habitation. Other calls resulted in referrals to fellow wildlife rehabilitators that had more appropriate caging for the species involved. And a good percentage of the remaining calls resulted in successfully reuniting baby birds and mammals with their biological parents thus allowing us to concentrate on wildlife that was truly orphaned or injured.



Birds once again comprised the greatest percentage of our intakes. We admitted 459 birds representing 63 different species. Three species, American Robins, Carolina Wrens and Chimney Swifts, comprised 30% of our intakes. And for the first time, Northern Mockingbirds and Mourning Doves rounded out the top 5. Our bird intakes were down slightly from last year due to our increased efforts to renest and reunite the nestlings and fledglings with their parents. We were able to return nearly 70% of the birds we admitted to their free and wild lives.



Our small mammal intakes were up 24% from last year. We admitted 239 fur kids, with Eastern Gray Squirrels and Virginia Opossums comprising 92% of our intakes. And we were able to release 95% of our mammals back to their natural habitats. We did see a marked decrease in the number of Eastern Cottontails we admitted, in part because of increased efforts to "put the bunny back" as well as a new rehabilitator in the mid-state who is specializing in cottontails.



Our reptile team admitted 48 turtles this year. The majority of our intakes were Eastern Box Turtles, primarily suffering from injuries after being struck by lawnmowers or cars. Twelve of our shelled friends have spent the winter with us, including two unusual patients — a Common Snapping Turtle and a False Map Turtle. We are on track to release approximately 75% of the turtles we've admitted.

Meet the Ziggy's Tree Team

Angela Hensley Founder/Board President/Mammal Specialist

Angela is a Hoosier (Indiana native) who has lived in Tennessee much longer than she cares to say. She graduated with a degree in business administration from Indiana University and a minor in Biology. She lives on a small rural farm just outside of Murfreesboro, Tennessee.

Angela started her rehabilitation career after finding a baby squirrel in the mouth of a deceased mother squirrel who was lying in the middle of the road. The tiny pink squirrel was ice cold and barely alive. She put it in her pocket to keep him warm and headed to work. When she arrived at work and started calling vets offices to see who could take this tiny animal, she found there were few resources in the area. She finally got on-line and got some information on raising a squirrel, having no idea that this was illegal in the state of Tennessee. She was determined to become a licensed rehabilitator so that she could take care of this squirrel (Ziggy). After mistakenly identifying Ziggy as a boy (Ziggy was a girl) and realizing how much she had to learn, she was able to volunteer with Walden's Puddle and Tangled Wing Wildlife and complete the hours to become rehabilitator. Our organization was named after the the huge shagbark Hickory tree that was Ziggy's home after she was released. Little did Angela realize at the time how much this tiny squirrel would impact her life's path.



LouAnn Partington Secretary/Treasurer/Avian Specialist

LouAnn was born and raised in Ohio and graduated from Kent State University with a Bachelor's in Business Administration prior to moving to California for her corporate job.



LouAnn has been involved in wildlife rehabilitation for over 30 years. She began her career volunteering at WildCare in San Rafael, CA. She was immediately hooked when she was asked to foster 2 baby birds on her first day volunteering. While at WildCare she held several volunteer positions including supervisor, animal care technician, foster care program coordinator. She also developed an intern training manual and assisted with several fundraisers. In addition to serving on the WildCare Board of Directors, she filled roles as Interim Animal Care Director and Interim Executive Director prior to her move to Tennessee to be closer to family.

LouAnn obtained her own permit after moving to Tennessee and joined Ziggy's Tree soon after the organization incorporated as a non-profit. She specializes in songbirds but is federally permitted to intake all native species of birds.

Rachel Singer At-Large Director/Reptile Specialist

Rachel has been a licensed wildlife rehabilitator for only two years but has been caring for animals for most of her life. A lifelong animal lover, Rachel earned her BS from MTSU in Animal Science where she could follow her love of horses to college. After she graduated, she was fortunate enough to enjoy several great jobs with animals including hoof stock keeper at the Nashville Zoo, Horse Wrangler at Land Between the Lakes, Environmental Educator with the US Forest Service, and Coordinator of the Wilderness Station in Murfreesboro. Currently Rachel accepts all reptiles and amphibians for rehab but her "heart" animal is turtles.

Joy Clay Chrisman, Ph.D., PMP At-Large Director

Joy grew up in Tullahoma, and now lives in Franklin, TN. Joy attended Vanderbilt University for her Bachelor's in Communication Studies and TSU's Institute of Government for both her Masters & Doctorate in Public Administration. She worked as the Director of Development and



Marketing at several local nonprofit organizations before moving into the nonprofit consulting arena as a Senior Consultant for Blackbaud which allowed her to travel the world and reside in Australia for one year to establish the Australasia consulting division. Now she is a Managing Consultant specializing in healthcare administration and IT project management and no longer travels for work, a choice made 17 years ago to permit her to pursue her doctorate as well as rescue and care for her special needs draft horse Curly Joe who was only 6 months old at the time (pictured current day), plus rescue and adopt 14 special needs guinea pigs to date.

Joy has worked with numerous wildlife rehabilitation centers, zoos, humane societies, university veterinary schools, aquariums, farm sanctuaries, and marine mammal and shark research centers around the world as a consultant and volunteer. Her favorite assignment by far was working with Steve Irwin to create his Wildlife Warriors Foundation as she was allowed to engage with all zoo residents and volunteer in both the Australia Zoo's captive breeding program for endangered species and the emergency veterinary clinic. Steve cured her of her fear of snakes (not an easy task) with his pet rosy boa named Rosy and even allowed Joy to participate in crocodile relocation efforts. He was a true inspiration and opened her heart to love all species no matter how dangerous or scary they may seem! Joy also accompanied Steve and marine biologists around the globe on shark research outings, cage diving with Great Whites and swimming with Tiger, Hammerhead, Bull, Nurse, Lemon, Bonnethead, Sand Tiger, Sandbar, and Black Tip Reef sharks to tag and study these magnificent creatures and their effect on marine mammal populations.

Joy began rescuing animals (turtles and frogs) at the very early age of 3, and has continued to rescue farm animals, domestic pets, and wildlife to this day. She started an animal rights group on Vanderbilt's campus, volunteered at Saddle Up and Nashville Humane, and served as the Board President for Happy Tales Humane in Franklin. She called upon Ziggy's Tree during one of her many wildlife rescues and first met LouAnn to drop off an abandoned baby Robin. Joy was so impressed with Ziggy's Tree she did not hesitate to accept when LouAnn asked her to join the Board! Joy relentlessly rescues wildlife (especially opossum) while advancing the mission of Ziggy's Tree.
